

Vecinos reaches out to low-income, uninsured, and farmworker communities by offering integrated primary and behavioral health care services through both its outpatient clinics and mobile medical clinics. These services are essential for the patient population, who often live in remote areas and lack access to consistent medical care. In 2024, Vecinos' mobile and outpatient clinics served as the primary care home to more than 800 farmworkers and low-income, uninsured adults across 9 counties in Western North Carolina. The clinic team also worked diligently to ensure that mental health needs were met, recognizing the high levels of stress and psychological strain many farmworkers endure due to their working and living conditions.


Patients also have access to telehealth services, which expanded in 2024 to ensure that folks in rural areas could continue receiving care without needing to travel long distances. These efforts are particularly critical given the transient nature of the migrant farmworker workforce, and Vecinos works tirelessly to bridge the gap between these workers and the care they need.





Since 2004, Vecinos has provided mobile and outpatient primary and behavioral healthcare to migrant and seasonal farmworkers across Western North Carolina. Agriculture is vital to our region's economy and culture, and it depends on a healthy workforce. Yet farmworkers often face significant barriers to

care, including transportation, cost, language, and lack of insurance. Vecinos partners directly with workers and growers to ensure meaningful access to high-quality, culturally centered healthcare. Your support directly strengthens the health of our agricultural workforce and our entire region.



OUTREACH AND SPECIAL PROGRAMS

Vecinos has long been committed to improving the lives and health outcomes of farmworkers in Western North Carolina. Recognizing the vital role farmworkers play in the region's agricultural economy, Vecinos continues to direct its outreach efforts to ensure these essential workers receive not only the medical care they need but also the social support and resources required to overcome the unique challenges they face.

Through its outreach efforts, Vecinos has not only addressed immediate health concerns but has also worked toward building long-term resilience. The organization's programs, including Health Education, focus mainly on promoting safe hygiene and sanitation practices. Health promotion and disease prevention for chronic conditions like diabetes, hypertension, and prediabetes, have seen impressive improvements in patient outcomes. Our Community Health Workers provide ongoing support and education to ensure that farmworkers and their families are empowered to manage their health year-round.

In 2024, Vecinos deepened its commitment to farmworkers through ongoing partnerships and initiatives. These include collaborations with local and regional organizations. This community-based approach ensures that farmworkers can navigate both immediate crises and long-term health challenges.

As Vecinos looks to the future, the **Community Health Hub** will become an even greater focal point of outreach for farmworkers and their families, offering a one-stop location for comprehensive health care, social services, and community support as well as a well-resourced jumping-off point for the outreach and mobile clinic teams. The **Hub's** opening in May 2025 will provide a robust space for farmworkers to access services they might otherwise go without, helping to ensure their health and well-being for years to come.

Vecinos is proud to be a part of the farmworker community and remains steadfast in its mission to provide culturally competent, accessible, and compassionate care. By continuing to meet the evolving needs of farmworkers, Vecinos ensures they receive the support they deserve, building a healthier, more resilient community in Western North Carolina.

Hurricane Helene Response

In the wake of **Hurricane Helene**, Vecinos mobilized quickly to address the immediate needs of farmworkers who were disproportionately impacted by the storm. With many farmworkers residing in rural, often isolated areas, Vecinos set up food and supply drives, as well as health fairs, to distribute essential resources and provide access to emergency medical care. Satellite connectivity was secured to ensure communication with farmworker camps and homes, where access to technology is limited, to facilitate the coordination of these critical relief efforts.

The Farmworker Relief Fund was established immediately after the hurricane's impact, allowing Vecinos to raise over \$50,000 from various donors, including individuals and foundations. These funds were vital in supporting the day one recovery of the farmworker community, also over \$300,000 in donations to provide food, supplies, and assistance to clear debris from crop land, enabling farmworkers to resume their work and support WNC's agricultural economy. The farmworker community's resilience in the face of such hardship was evident, and Vecinos was honored to stand beside them in their recovery journey.

In the months that followed, Vecinos' outreach continued to adapt to the needs of the farmworker community. The organization expanded its support with the **Community Assistance Fund**, which focuses on helping farmworkers make sustainable repairs to their housing. Recognizing that safe, stable housing is foundational to good health, this initiative

aims to reduce living conditions that exacerbate mental and physical health issues faced by farmworkers. Vecinos' Community Health Hub, slated to open in May 2025, will serve as a Resilience Hub and central resource for farmworkers and other low-income individuals.

QUALITY IMPROVEMENT

In 2024, Vecinos its quality

As a department, the team is able to holistically analyze the quality of services and experiences for our patients.

In its first year, the department

patients benefited from the following achievements:

- Increased telehealth encounters by 159% from 69 in 2023 to 179
- Focused women's health initiative that engaged women and their families in health education, celebrations. self-breast exams, stress management, nutrition, and cervical cancer screenings. As a result, cervical cancer screenings increased by 93% from 2023.
- Improved colorectal cancer screening methods, resulting in their screenings than in 2022.

Vecinos was honored to host the University of Tennessee School of Pharmacy in summer 2024. Pharmacy students participated in the many aspects of Vecinos' medical and outreach efforts. At the end of their clinical rotation with Vecinos, the students left us with impactful guidance on some of the key issues we had been facing.

In 2024, Vecinos partnered with **MedServe NC** to launch Vecinos' first two-year AmeriCorps-funded service-learning fellowship in primary care medicine for a recent college graduate. Through this collaboration, the Vecinos MedServe fellow is gaining invaluable hands-on experience and community engagement by serving rural and underserved communities in Western North Carolina. The fellow brings to Vecinos a passion for learning, a strong commitment to the mission, and a diverse skill set, all coupled with a positive and dedicated attitude!

Vecinos - Community Health Hub, an SECU Campus

In July 2024, renovations on the
Community Health Hub began. The
building is scheduled to begin serving
patients in May 2025. The "Hub" is a
multi-use, 16,500 square foot space that colocates medical, dental, and social health services
through formal partnerships by like-minded organizations. The
building is geared towards serving low-income, uninsured and
underinsured members of our community, especially those in
need of bilingual services.


In addition to Vecinos' integrated primary and behavioral health services, partner agencies will provide the following services:

The Hub provides a warm, functional, and culturally affirming atmosphere that promotes healing, comfort, and trust.




BEHAVIORAL HEALTH TEAM

In addition to the dangerous occupational risks faced by agricultural farmworkers, living conditions are often substandard. These houses are characterized by crowded spaces, lack of privacy, and limited facilities for cooking, showering, or laundering clothes. They are

predominantly located in remote areas where farmworkers are dependent on their employer for transportation. Altogether, these conditions can contribute to a sense of physical and psychological isolation. This is especially true for migrant workers who are away from their families and have little to no support mechanisms.

Vecinos recognizes that these experiences, unique to farmworkers, cause strain on mental health and underline the need for access to behavioral health care and resources. The behavioral health team works closely with the primary care team through an integrated and collaborative care service model. Striving to work with every Vecinos patient, the team assesses patients on multiple domains of mental health and addresses elevated concerns in a culturally centered and individualized manner. While Vecinos has a dedicated behavioral health team, emotional support and health education occurs across all encounters at Vecinos. The entire organization is oriented towards and trained to provide support in the way the patient most needs it. There is "no wrong door" at Vecinos.



Value of impact
